

Senate File 522, signed in to law by Governor Kim Reynolds and effective July I, 2022, created new statutes for elder abuse, older adult abuse and moved penalties for dependent adult abuse in the criminal code

The initiation and filing of criminal charges is the sole responsibility of law enforcement and the county attorney. The Iowa HHS, DIAL and the Area Agencies on Aging have no authority in criminal charges

Criminal penalties: Moved from Iowa Code 235E.4 to Iowa Code 726.26 **MOVED**

NEW CRIMINAL ELDER ABUSE

Elder Abuse

- Section 726.24
- Elder abuse includes deprivation of care, neglect, physical abuse, emotional abuse, sexual abuse and isolation
- Victim is 60 or older AND unable to protect self as the result of a mental condition, physical condition, or personal circumstance which results in increased risk of harm
- Abuse can be perpetrated by anyone



NEW CRIMINAL ELDER ABUSE

Elder Abuse Financial Exploitation

- Section 726.25
- Victim is 60 or older
- Knowingly and by undue influence, deception, coercion, fraud, breach of fiduciary duty, or extortion obtains control over or otherwise uses the benefits, property, resources, belongings or assets to the detriment of the older individual
- Financial exploitation from a person who stands in a position of trust or confidence with the older individual

Class B Felony

More than \$50,000 If 70-80 years old, \$15,000 or more If 80 years or older, \$5,000 or more

Class C Felony \$10,001 - \$50,000

Class D Felony \$1,001 - \$10,000
